HIGHLIGHTS OF THE MONTH

Omicron cases have risen during the wedding and festival season, prompting authorities to reinstate curbs that were eased after case counts had dropped. States such as Maharashtra, Gujarat, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, Haryana, Uttar Pradesh, Assam, Uttarakhand along with Delhi have imposed night curfews as of 27th December, 2021.





Max Verstappen edged out Lewis Hamilton on the final lap of the Abu Dhabi Grand Prix on Sunday, 12th December, to win his first Formula One world championship.

In an address to the nation on Saturday, 25th December, the Prime Minister announced that India will start giving booster shots to health and frontline workers and those above 60 from January 10th. He also announced that vaccinations will begin for children between 15 and 18 years from January 3rd.







Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Thursday, 23rd December, inaugurated and laid the foundation stones of 27 development projects worth Rs 2,095 crore in his Varanasi parliamentary constituency ahead of the Uttar Pradesh assembly elections.

On Monday 6th December, India and Russia signed 28 agreements to further broad-base their partnership and vowed to expand cooperation and coordination in dealing with major challenges like the threat of terrorism and the unfolding situation in Afghanistan, during the Modi-Putin Summit.






Walt Disney: The Man whose success began with a mouse

"I only hope that we never lose sight of one thing — that it all started with a mouse." — Walt Disney

Ever heard of Mickey Mouse? I am sure the mouse is a part of all our childhood memories. Mickey mouse was the inception of the world's greatest animation production house: 'Disney', created by Walt Disney.

Walter Elias Disney was born on December 5, 1901. He was an American entrepreneur, animator, writer, voice actor, and film producer. He introduced several developments in the production of cartoons. As a film producer, he holds the records for the most Academy Awards earned by an individual, having won 22 Oscars from 59 nominations.





Disney developed an early interest in drawing. He took art classes as a boy and got a job as a commercial illustrator at the age of 18. He moved to California in the early 1920s and set up the 'Disney Brothers Studio' with his brother, Roy. With Ub Iwerks, he developed the character 'Mickey Mouse' in 1928 — his first highly popular success. He also provided the voice for his creation in the early years.

Most of his creations — including Mickey Mouse, Donald Duck and Goofy — are instantly recognisable global icons and his movies are blockbusters in the film industry. Walt Disney has truly given us the inspiration to use our imagination and escape from reality.

MOVIE: THE GRINCH

This movie is for the child in all our hearts. Inspired by the 1957 Dr. Seuss book, "How the Grinch Stole Christmas", this movie revolves around a cantankerous, green-furred Grinch, who has a heart "two sizes too small".

THE PLOT

This story kicks off with an antisocial Grinch living in a cave up a snowy mountain with his canine companion, Max. This mountain overlooks the cheerful town of Whoville, which is gearing up for the Christmas season. The Grinch loathes all form of celebration; a feeling that emerged from his disjointed childhood, where he spent his days in an orphanage spending all his Christmases alone. To inflict the same feeling of isolation, the Grinch devises a plan to steal Christmas from the people of Whoville. 

The tallest Christmas tree ever displayed was in Seattle, Washington. It measured 221 feet tall.
